A first appearance on TG4 All-Ireland Final day for Antrim since 2016 – or Carlow's maiden voyage?

All will be revealed in this afternoon's TG4 All-Ireland Junior Championship semi-final, with Croke Park potentially just an hour away for one of these counties, barring extra-time and perhaps even free kicks.

They've met already in the round-robin phase of the competition and while Antrim ran out 5-20 to 2-13 winners, that result is skewed somewhat as the fixture went to extra-time and it was only then that the Saffrons pulled away.

That was Carlow's first game of the competition, too, while Antrim had added motivation and incentive following defeat to Derry in their opening fixture.

Victory for Carlow would send the county into a very first adult inter-county Final, while Antrim are no strangers to the big day, having contested Junior deciders in 2016, 2012 and 2009.

It should be an entertaining game, as the sides have registered 20-89 between them in eight games.

Antrim have racked up 11-49 from four matches to date, with Carlow collecting 9-40.

There's little to separate them and there's genuine scoring threat on both starting teams. Carlow have the Junior Championship's leading scorer in scintillating form. Clíodhna Ní Shé is on 6-14

currently and very much in the race for the ZuCar Golden Boot award, which will be presented to the leading scorer in the 2021 TG4 All-Ireland Championships.

Antrim players haven't been shy about finding the target either, with Cathy Carey (1-16), Grainne McLaughlin (2-10), Caitlin Taggart (3-6) and Aoife Taggart (3-4) impressing.

Match Preview



Carey and Caitlin Taggart (1-5 each) were in good scoring form when the sides met previously, while McLaughlin and Aoife Taggart collected 1-3 each on that occasion.

Carlow will have those players marked out for close marking while Ní Shé (1-5) was their own leading scorer on the day.

Both sides collected two wins each in that round robin phase and have shown that they're genuine Championship contenders. For one, however, the journey will end this afternoon.



A: We are absolutely delighted to be involved in the later stages of the Championship campaign. It's an amazing time to still be playing football. We had the final four as our aim from the get-go this year so it proves that our hard work has paid off. There is an incredible buzz going around the Antrim camp at the minute and a tenacity about training. We are all fighting for positions and for the first time in years we have a panel with depth and around 30 girls who have the potential to get us to Croke Park.

Q: What's been the most encouraging aspect of Antrim's progress to the semifinal?

A: I think more than anything it's the resilience we've shown this year. We lost our opening game to Derry, who we had beaten quite comfortably in our previous meetings. The girls regrouped and then we played Carlow, which ended up in extra time, and again the girls never once gave up. We fought hard and came away with an amazing win which led us to Limerick, where we again fought hard to the end to come away with a victory.

Q: Your opponents are Carlow, who you defeated after extra-time in the group stages. How big a test will this be for Antrim?

A: I think anyone watching the Junior championship this year can tell how closely-matched the teams have been. Carlow are a strong, physical team who really pushed us in the group stages, we have no doubt we'll be up against it when we meet in the semi-final. They will be wanting to get their own back but we have trained incredibly hard and in all the years I've played for Antrim, I don't think we've ever knitted together as much as one unit. We want this and will do everything we can on Sunday to win.

Our main focus is our performance as opposed to who we play. We need a big game from every player who crosses that line, that's our aim.

Q: What is it like preparing to meet a county again when you've played against them quite recently?

A: I think it's easy for teams to turn up and play with an air of complacency after previously beating a team. We won't be going in with that attitude. We lost our last game to Wicklow and we knew we didn't perform. Our main focus is our performance as opposed to who we play. We need a big game from every player who crosses that line, that's our aim.

With our team being very young, they radiate confidence that allows all of us to have a fearless approach to games. We are ready and focussed on our task.

Q: How big a boost would making it to the Final be for Antrim?

A: Over the past number of years, Antrim ladies have had some amazing success in underage competitions, we aim to continue this success. We have faced managers leaving, a global pandemic and a lot of doubters over the past few years. We have regrouped, have two outstanding managers in and are ready to prove people wrong. It would be an amazing end to an fantastic year for us to reach Croke Park on the 5th.

Q: How do you prepare your team for big games like this? Is it a case that you try to steer clear of the hype – or do you try to embrace it?


A: I think there's an element of both. This is why you play football, you want to reach the knockout stages, play on the big days and feel that level of success, but also not overly concern yourself with the hype. With our team being very young, they radiate confidence that allows all of us to have a fearless approach to games. We are ready and focussed on our task.

Q: How have you found the year 2021 in general, returning to a more normal calendar and progressing to an All-Ireland semi-final?

A: I think like most people, 2021 has brought with it a renewed sense of normal. Football has been a release to so many of us and actually being able to fulfil all fixtures and compete week in, week out brings its own comforts. It allows consistency and for our team to develop and grow to get to where we need to be.

Q: It's almost time for the 2021 TG4 All-Ireland Junior Championship semi-final. How excited are you about the clash with Antrim?

A: We are all really excited for the match. It's great to be coming into it after such a good match last weekend against Limerick, I feel the team has finally started to build a bit of momentum, which makes the process and preparation all the more enjoyable.

Q: What's been the most encouraging aspect of Carlow's progress to the semi-final?

A: I think the fact that we saw visible improvement with the team throughout the season has been the most encouraging and exciting part. We have started to gel very well as a team and the work we have been doing at training is finally starting to show.

Q: Your opponents are Antrim, who defeated you after extra-time in the group stages. How big a test will this be for Carlow?

A: Every match this year has been a battle, there was nothing between any of the teams really. Having drawn with Antrim in normal time highlights the small margins between us. However, after suffering a big defeat from them in extra-time, we know we will have to step up hugely to meet the challenge this weekend.

Q: What is it like preparing to meet a county again when you've played against them quite recently?

A: Having played against them so recently makes the preparation a bit different. We know lots about them now and can plan accordingly, but unfortunately they can do the same. Hopefully we can learn from the mistakes we made the last time and not let history repeat itself in that way.

Q: How big a boost would making it to the Final be for Carlow?

A: It would be unbelievable, even the excitement among the team last weekend after qualifying for this All-Ireland semi-final was huge. I can't even imagine the buzz around the team and our supporters if we do qualify for the Final.

We have started to gelvery well as a team and the work we have been doing at training is finally starting to show.

Q: How do you prepare your team for big games like this? Is it a case that you try to steer clear of the hype – or do you try to embrace it?

A: There is a balance to be struck in this sort of scenario. Obviously you have to avoid distractions and focus on the game but you do have to enjoy occasions like this. Allowing a bit of hype and excitement can help some players rise to the occasion, while some prefer to treat it like any normal game.

Q: How have you found the year 2021 in general, returning to a more normal calendar and progressing to an All-Ireland semi-final?

A: It was obviously a tough year with Covid and all the uncertainty at the start of the season. At times it didn't look like we would have a season at all so getting back to group training and making it to an All-Ireland Final would make all of the tough lockdown sessions alone worth it.
